#### THE ORIGINS OF SAINT VALENTINES DAY

It is believed that Valentine was a bishop who was martyred on February 14, 376 BC. His bishop's ring was an amethyst and carved with cupids which are a symbol of love. Amethyst is the birthstone of February and the gem is a symbol of love.

His ring made him recognizable to Roman soldiers who wished to get married. Roman soldiers were forbidden to marry, but Bishop Valentine was willing to perform weddings for these couples. At the end of the ceremony, he gave the newlyweds a heart that he had cut out of parchment as a reminder of their vows.

Inevitably, he was arrested and sentenced to death. While in prison, he cured Julia, the daughter of his jailer, of blindness. On the evening of his execution, he is supposed to have written the first ever Valentine card to Julia, signing it "From Your Valentine", a phrase still popular today.

Sending Valentine cards, offering confectionery and presenting flowers to the person you love, began in Britain in the 1800's and has become the customary way to celebrate Valentine's Day throughout the English-speaking world.

The long, cold month of February is a good time to celebrate the warmth of love.

and your nose gets frozen shut.


Yes, the winter here is lovely so I guess I'll hang around.



I spent the first two years of my life, living with my parents, at my Grandmother's home/restaurant 'The Yellow Briar Inn' at 10 and Steeles in Brampton. My parents then bought their first home in Port Credit. When I was 10 I moved to Guelph along with my parents and two younger sisters. We spent our summers at my Grandmother's cottage on Skeleton Lake, here in Muskoka. It was at one of the dances, held every Saturday at the lake marina, that I met fellow cottager Jim Davidson. I was 15 and he was 19. At that time Jim was a bit of a local lake celebrity, as he was playing for the Toronto Marlboros Junior A hockey team and his father was a former Toronto Maple Leaf player and captain, and at that time the Chief Scout and Personnel Director for the Leafs Organization. Not being interested in hockey, I remember not being that impressed, but Jim seemed nice and we became friends. The next two summers we both worked at Raymond General Store together, and let's just say by the end of the second summer we were engaged. Jim had spent the past two years in Tulsa, Oklahoma playing on the Toronto Maple Leaf's farm team the 'Tulsa Oilers', while I was attending high school at Guelph Collegiate Vocational Institute. After a career ending injury to Jim's ankle, he enrolled at George Brown College to become an electrician. I completed high school in June and we were married in August, 1969. While Jim went to George Brown College, I attended Toronto Teacher's College. After we both graduated we moved to an apartment in Mississauga. I had been hired by the Peel Board of Education and Jim began working for the electrical company, Plan Group. We bought our first home in Erin Mills, Mississauga. We lived in that home for the next 37 years. We raised three sons, and made many lifelong friends on Masthead Crescent. It was a new neighbourhood, young parents with young children, and we all grew up together! The boys often say they have never experienced anything like it since, even now within their own neighbourhoods. I retired from teaching after 18 years and purchased a wholesale printing company franchise, called 'Canadian Wholesale Thermographers', together with my sister and brother-in-law. Tragically in 2001, we lost our youngest son Josh, at just 23, at the lake. Josh's passing was the determining factor in buying our own cottage on the lake so we could feel closer to him. After the printing company was sold in 2010, and Jim was ready to retire from Plan Group, we moved full time to the lake. My sister Ginny joined us. I have continued to stay active, primarily volunteering at the South Muskoka Memorial Hospital. I served on the executive for 10 years, and continue to enjoy volunteering, now in the auxiliary gift shop. I have also been actively involved with our Probus club and continue to enjoy the friendship of my fellow members. Our two eldest sons, Scott and Bryce, married wonderful girls (both teachers!) and have blessed us with six amazing grandchildren, five boys and one girl, ranging in ages from 23 to 6. The past year has been an exceptionally hard one for me. Jim was diagnosed with Alzheimer's in 2019 and last year it became necessary to move Jim into long-term care as his disease has advanced to the stage

where he needs 24 hour care. I am so thankful that between our sons, Jim's brother Tom and myself, Jim has a family member with him every day. I always smile, when I remember my grandmother saying several years ago, "Don't get interested in a summer romance, they never last". Well 55 years and counting! What a blessing!
