#### AT OUR LAST MEETING:

#### Special Interest: Margaret McLaren: Why Birds Sing

Marg pointed out that birds have two sets of vocal cords (syringes), which enable them to make two different sounds at once. She showed sonograms indicating harmonics and frequency of sound. While birds hear much the same pitch range as humans, their ability to discriminate time is much greater. What we hear as a buzz, they hear as separate sounds. What is song? The technical definition of a songbird is

one that has a muscle on its leg, enabling it to lock on to a perch, but not all songbirds are musical and it is not only birds that we think of as songbirds that sing. Crows, for example are songbirds! Grouse, owls and woodpeckers are not songbirds but they all make sounds intended to attract a mate, which is a main function of bird song. The other main function is to stake a claim to a territory for nesting. In order to identify neighbours, birds match songs. This saves energy since they know it is a neighbour singing and not a stranger intruding on their territory. Most singing happens in the mornings because of the lighter air quality and the fact that insects are not yet out.



Marg suggests making a short list of bird songs when beginning to learn identification, using these classifications: 1) Those who make Robin-like songs 2) Trillers 3) Whistlers 4)Those who sing complex songs. There are also birds specific to towns (Mourning Doves, House Wrens), grasslands, shrubs (goldfinch, song sparrow), and forests (Scarlet Tanager, many in the Robin-like category). The most common forest bird in Muskoka is the Red-Eyed Vireo. We were treated to a wide-ranging sample of bird "song"

#### Guest Speaker: Elizabeth Hughes-- How to Shop and What to Look For

Based on years of experience with the Ontario Consumer Price Index, a department of Statistics Canada, and on having written and taught the training manual for those working on the C.P.I. before she retired, Elizabeth brings a vast knowledge to her subject. The C.P.I. may be the most important part of Stats. Can., as it establishes the cost of living for an average family at a given time, and decisions such as determining the Old Age Pension are based on it. Therefore, great care must be taken by those who check prices and quality in various stores and businesses.

Among Elizabeth's many tips were these: Your clothing label tells in which plant your article was made. CA plus a number indicates Made in Canada and at which location. Just google the number. (R.N. is the American code). If there are two numbers, the one on the washing label supercedes. Sometimes the price of an article, e.g. a man's shirt, won't have changed for years but on close inspection you will notice a lower thread count which enables the price to remain the same. The quality of men's clothing has deteriorated over the past 20 years, so watch for no placket or flange on a shirt cuff, no flaps for pockets, fewer buttons. (The buttoned-down shirt has virtually disappeared.) .Men's suit prices have remained much the same but such things as vents, pocket flaps and self-lining are gone. In sport or golf shirts, look for a binding on the neck and vents on the side hem, which give more comfortable wear.

You can follow Canada's Food Guide by only shopping the outside aisles of grocery stores. Larger stores usually have fresher products because they move quickly but aren't always cheaper. Watch expiry dates in discount stores. When purchasing paper towels and tissues, check on the number of sheets and size of sheets to determine best buy. Some products have actually been reduced in amount but not in package size (toothpaste, coffee). Much of this happened with the shift to metric. Forget laundry concentrates, and use smaller amounts of big boxes. Buy mattresses and cars in Feb.; dishes and silverware in June. Gas used to go up on Weds. but is no longer consistent. When buying audio/video products check that the store will stand behind their warranty. Wrinkle-free clothing, once ironed, is no longer wrinkle-free!
